
November 2014 ~ President's Message

Why have a ZONE festival?

It's been a tough year. Across the province, teachers are tired, and still recovering from a long, stressful strike. We started off the year already behind, and Drama teachers are usually pressed for time as it is. It has been tempting for many of us to cut back on our usual pile of activities, and some have already decided that shows and events will be postponed, or moved to a later date, or not get done at all.

One thing that I will never skip, regardless of what kind of stress I am under, is our Zone festival. If you have a successful Zone, you may understand why I feel this way. If there is no Zone festival in your area, this might help you decide to start one up.

I work in Campbell River, BC, and am part of Zone 10 on North Vancouver Island, which is Duncan/Ladysmith, all the way up to Port Hardy. Our Zone is BIG, and it is successful, and it is growing, and there's a good reason why it's something North island teachers are not keen on missing. It rejuvenates us!

Every February, a dedicated group of teachers and students get together to celebrate theatre. Yes, it is a competition, in which one play will be chosen to represent our Zone at the Provincial festival, but we have managed to keep the competitiveness out, in favour of a weekend of sharing theatre with each other.

Our festival is two days of workshops, and three nights of shows, and is so successful that we are having to think about adding another day, or turning away potential performances. The reason is, everyone wants to come and be part of this great weekend. The students get an opportunity to work and play with other theatre kids, they get to learn from amazing theatre professionals, they get to share their work, and they get to see the work of others in their zone. In Zone 10, it is a requirement that all students and their teachers attend all plays and workshops, and that teachers be present to supervise and learn with their students. It truly builds the feeling of teamwork we are trying to foster.

The teachers get an opportunity to see each other, talk about their year, share ideas, celebrate, and support each other. There are regulars, who attend every year without fail, and there are some who pop in every few years, and then take a break. There are veteran teachers and first timers. Whatever the mixture, it just seems to work. This is the stuff we, and our students, will remember for years to come.

Is there no Zone festival in your area? Have you often thought about getting one started? You only need 4 schools from your Zone to be eligible. If you don't know how to get started, we can help. Feel free to email if you have questions

Ideas from colleagues...

Mime Unit—'Pairs on Chairs'

Time: 20 mins

Grade: 6-8

Skill Development: concentration, mime, focus, body awareness, creativity, cooperation.

Ask the students to find a partner, collect a chair and find a place in the room. Each pair needs to improvise a scene where one person would be sitting in a chair and the other is offering them a service. The only catch is that you are not allowed to speak.

E.g hairdresser, dentist...

Watch each performance quickly, and discuss which ones were effective and why.

There may be a number of groups who pretend to speak without sound. This is not mime, but pretending to speak.

Use one example and discuss how you could design a scene where you never had to speak.

E.g. person sitting on a seat, pretending to be on a moving bus. Old person struggles up the aisle, young person stands up, smiles, and motions for the older person to sit. Both continue the journey looking forward as though on a moving bus.

Ask each group to design another mime scene using the chair.

Watch each and discuss the differences.

Drama games...

Sometimes Drama games are just a way to let the kids blow off steam and get a little crazy. Games like ATOM and HAPPY FAMILIES come to mind. Yes, those are fun games, and they certainly allow the kids to get to know each other, but often games that eliminate students are not what the class needs.

There are many AWARENESS games that can be used to build a sense of ensemble and awareness of the whole class, in which students must work together to achieve the goal. Here are a few that allow the group to feel success TOGETHER.

ZOOM

Type: Ensemble Building, Focus.

Purpose: This activity is great for getting the students working together and focussing them on everyone in the room. It is also a fantastic way to get to know your students. Watch how students respond to this activity and you will learn a lot about how they lead, how they follow, whether they are team players, whether they have trouble focussing...the list is endless. Use this activity to focus a chatty group, get an improve team on the same page, or just for fun.

Procedure: Students stand in a circle. No one speaks. All students must be aware of everyone at all times. One person starts by clapping their hands directly at a classmate and saying ZOOM at the same time. The student who receives the ZOOM must clap and say ZOOM at the exact same time it is passed to them. That person then passes the ZOOM to another classmate, and so on. Once the students get the hang of it, a rhythm will emerge. Encourage that rhythm. It might be slow as they learn how to work together, but as trust and awareness grows, they will naturally speed up. Don't allow them to just pass the ZOOM without the other person being ready. The two MUST ZOOM and clap TOGETHER always. Encourage the students to watch the ZOOM as it is passed between classmates, as it WILL come to them eventually, and they must be ready.

Counting to 20

Type: Ensemble Building, Focus.

Purpose: I've found this is a great game to play if having teamwork, discipline or respect issues within a group. It's extremely simple, but manages to focus the entire teams' energy on one simple task. When the goal is accomplished, the ensemble automatically feels a little stronger.

Procedure:

- 1. Actors stand in circle and look at the floor.
- 2. Any actor will start by saying "one."
- 3. Any other actor will continue by saying "two" and so on until you reach "ten" or "twenty."
- 4. If any two players say a number at the same time the group must start again at "one".

Variation: Instead of counting, have students step into the circle. If two people step in at the same time, they all start again.
