Constitutional Update

Notice of Proposed Constitutional Change at 2011 AGM

s per our ABCDE constitution, notice is hereby given to the membership that at the 2011 ABCDE AGM the executive will put forward a motion to change the constitution of ABCDE. The BCTF executive committee, upon review of our constitution (they approve all Constitution and subsequent changes), has asked us to clarify the language surrounding members/subscribers in the ABCDE.

A staff member of the BCTF was able to make suggestions as to how to do that. Below you will find the CURRENT version of Article 1 of our Constitution and a PROPOSED version of Article 1 of our Constitution. The quick synopsis of this proposed change is that it is required by the BCTF so that we clarify membership/subscriber status. It does clarify that student teachers are members of the ABCDE and can vote.

At the AGM, this motion will be debated and will be voted upon. It will require approval by three-quarters of the present members. If the ABCDE membership does approve the motion, then it will go to the BCTF executive committee for final approval. Constitutional Update continued...

CURRENT ARTICLE ONE:

Article 1 - Membership

The membership year shall be for 12 consecutive months from the date the application is processed by the BCTF.

- 1. ACTIVE Active membership shall be open to any person who is an active member of the BCTF upon payment of the appropriate PSA fee. An active member shall be entitled to vote and hold office.
- 2. ASSOCIATE Associate membership shall be open to any associate member of the BCTF upon payment of the appropriate PSA fee. An associate member shall be entitled to vote and to hold office in the PSA for positions other than president, vice-president, and representative to an outside agency.
- 3. STUDENT ASSOCIATE Student Associate membership shall be open to any student enrolled in programs of study in university/college programs leading to certification as teachers upon payment of the appropriate PSA fee. A student associate shall be entitled to vote and to hold office in the PSA positions other than president, vice-president, and representative to an outside agency.
- 4. RETIRED Retired-teacher membership shall be open to any honourary-associate member of the BCTF, upon payment of the appropriate PSA fee. A retired-teacher/honourary associate member shall be entitled to vote and hold office in the PSA for positions other than president, vice-president, and representative to an outside agency.
- 5. HONOURARY-LIFE Honourary-life membership may be conferred by the PSA. The honourary-life member's eligibility to vote or hold office depends upon his/her BCTF-member status.
- 6. SUBSCRIBER Subscription is available to an institution or person who is not a regular, associate, student, retired, or honourary-life member. A subscriber shall not be entitled to vote or hold office. The subscription year shall be for 12 consecutive months from the date the application is processed at the BCTF.

PROPOSED ARTICLE ONE:

Article 1 – Membership

MEMBERS: Membership in the PSA shall be open to all categories of BCTF members. The membership year shall be for 12 consecutive months from the date the application is processed by the BCTF. Reduced fees shall be available for students in university/college programs leading to teacher certification, teachers who retired from active membership in the BCTF, and teachers teaching on call (TTOCs).

SUBSCRIBERS – An institution or person who does not hold any form of BCTF membership can subscribe to the PSA for a fee. A subscriber shall not be entitled to vote or hold office. The subscription year shall be for 12 consecutive months from the date the application is processed at the BCTF.

Matthew Harrison:


Creative Professionalism for the Professional Creative

Drama in Education

Out of the Theatre and into the Classroom

rama activities can be a great way of building knowledge outside the theatre in Elementary School. It's time we

brought drama in education into these other spaces! Here is one example...

classroom. Many of us drama educators teach other courses, whether English, Modern Languages, or the full gamit

Horseshoe Counting Game in the Spanish 9 classroom

This is a modification of an Improvisational Warm Up Game. Students stand in a horseshoe formation. Number the students off in order, moving clockwise around the horseshoe. Of course this is the Spanish class, so the numbers are "uno, dos, tres, etc".

Student "uno" begins by saying his number and then the number of someone else in the group.

"Uno, catorce" (1, 14)

Then student 14, continues and says her number and a new number "Catorce, dos"

To make it more challenging:

- 1. You can't say the number of the person standing beside you
- 2. You can't say the number of the person who said your number
- 3. Throw in a rhythm that players have to say their number with the beat

When a student makes a mistake, they step out of the line and move to the end of the line, probably #27 or so. Then everyone else shifts to fill in the gap, and their numbers shift as well.

This is a very low risk way of getting students comfortable with speaking the target language in class. You can throw in funny things to say when a student makes a mistake, in the target language.

Also, you can sneak in more Spanish. When everyone gets confused and doesn't know what number they have, which happens a lot!, then you can get each student to say: "Yo tengo uno." "Yo tengo dos." "Yo tengo tres" ("I have one, I have two, I have three") The students are using the verb "to have" in an authentic communication manner!
